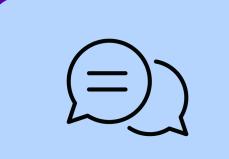

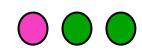

3 Tips to Improve Public Speaking Skills:

Tip 1: Plan and practice what you want to say.

What is the goal?

Does your speech have a beginning, middle, and end?

Is what you are saying relevant to the topic?

Tip 2: Know your audience and engage with them.

Can you connect this new information with something that your audience already knows? Tell an engaging story.

Tip 3: Pay attention to your body language.

Don't read from notes.

Speak loud enough for everyone to hear.

Look at your audience.

Use language that connects with your audience.

Use hand gestures, facial expressions, pace and tone, along with the way you stand or move around the room to pull your audience into the topic.

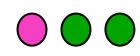










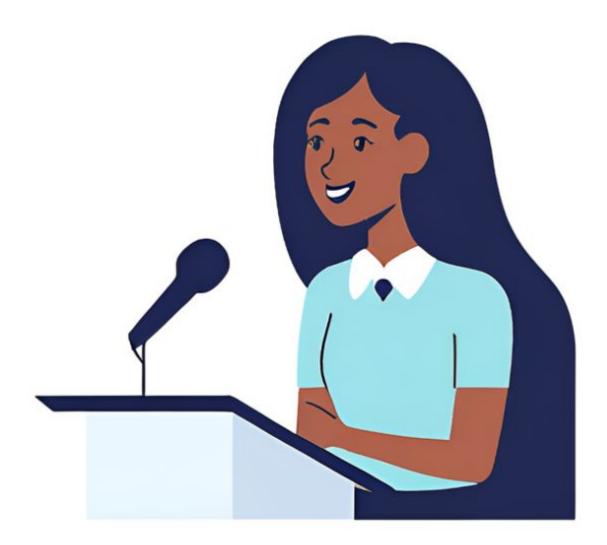

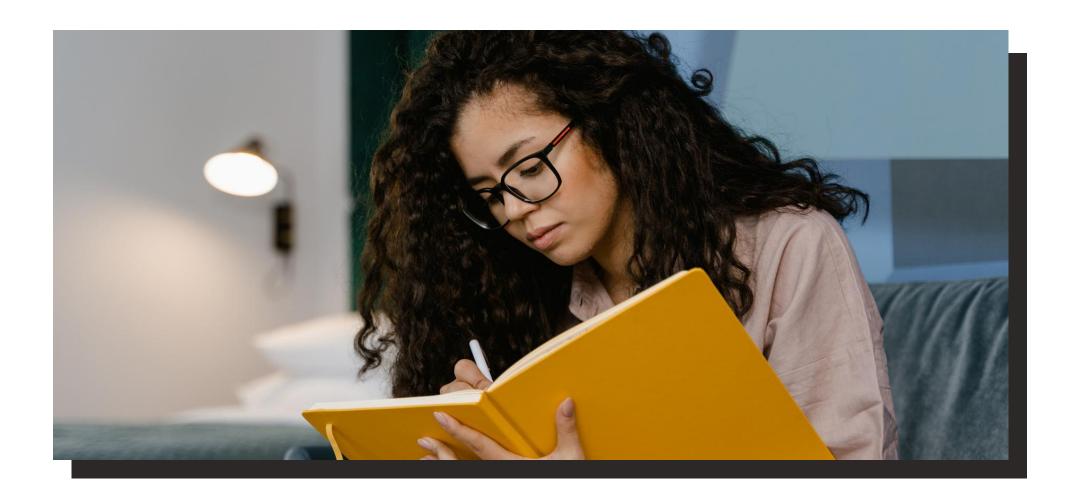
