

What communities are you part of? Why are communities so important in our lives?













DIVE IN



A **community** is defined as a group of people living or working together in the same area. A community can also be made up of people who share a common goal or interest. Communities can share a common goal, a common history, interests, or resources. For example, a family community might share common relatives. A group of people interested in video games may form a community where they share tips and strategies. A school is a community where resources are shared to provide people with an education. Your community could be this class, your school, a religious institution, the neighborhood you live in, or your city or town.

Communities can share a common goal, a common history, interests, or resources. Communities benefit when members of the community work together to help solve problems.


Communities offer support and services, but are also ways for members to contribute according to their interests and talents.












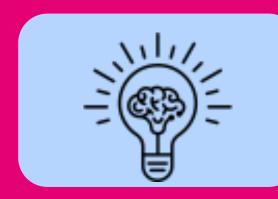
