
2. Activity: Working in small groups, create an action plan to solve the problem identified that needed to be solved within the school community.

Extend & Enrich


It may take more than one class period for students to complete their community service projects. Once students have had the chance to implement their projects, have students assess and evaluate the results of their project.

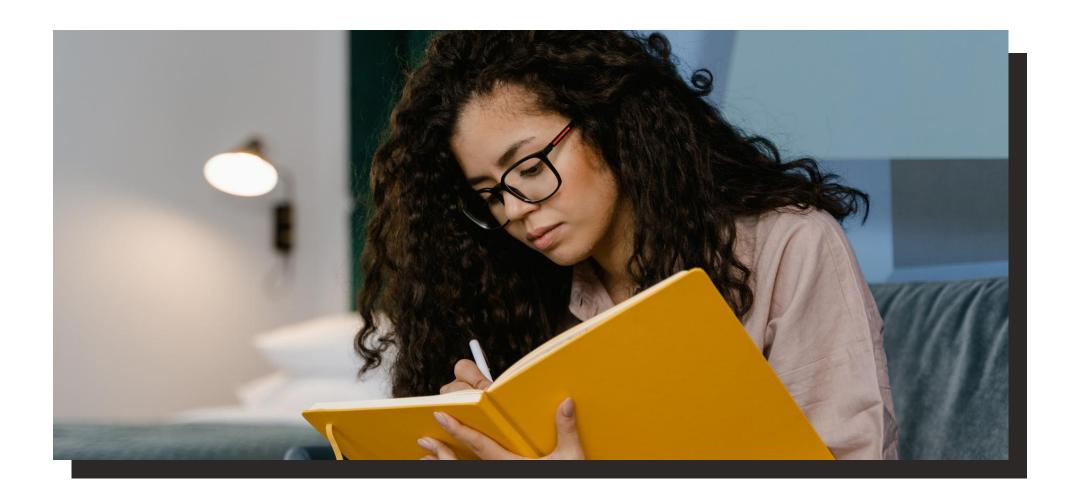
