Assessment Guide for Character Development Tool

- The student listens attentively during discussions.

3. Social Awareness (Understanding and empathizing with others)

- The student shows empathy by considering others' feelings.
- The student recognizes and values diversity in peers.
- The student expresses gratitude in daily interactions.
- The student uses positive language when speaking to others.

4. Relationship Skills (Establishing and maintaining positive relationships)

- The student works cooperatively with peers.
- The student is able to resolve conflicts peacefully.
- The student demonstrates kindness through words and actions.
- The student accepts constructive feedback without frustration.

5. Responsible Decision-Making (Making ethical and constructive choices)

- The student demonstrates honesty in various situations.
- The student practices problem-solving skills effectively.
- The student respects classroom rules and expectations.
- The student demonstrates responsibility by completing assigned tasks.

How to Administer the Assessment

1. Pre-Assessment (Before Lessons Begin)

- Observe students over the course of a few days to gather authentic insights.
- Do not influence students with prompts; instead, note natural behaviors.
- Rate students using the Likert scale based on their observed behaviors.
- Answer short response questions with specific examples.

2. Implementing Character Lessons

- Teach character-building lessons in a structured yet flexible manner.
- Reinforce character skills through class activities and peer interactions.
- Use modeling and role-playing to illustrate positive behaviors.
- Encourage self-reflection and discussions on character traits.

3. Post-Assessment (After Lessons are Completed)

- Conduct the assessment again using the same observational method.
- Compare results with the pre-assessment to measure student growth.
- Note any changes in behavior, language, or problem-solving skills.



Scoring and Interpretation

- 1-2 (Never/Rarely): The student does not yet demonstrate this behavior consistently. May require additional support.
- 3 (Sometimes): The student is developing this skill but needs reinforcement.
- 4-5 (Often/Always): The student demonstrates this behavior regularly and is making progress.

Using the Results:

- Identify Trends: Look for patterns in student behavior across different areas.
- Adjust Teaching Strategies: Tailor future lessons to address areas needing improvement.
- Provide Individualized Support: Offer extra guidance to students who score low in specific traits.
- Communicate with Parents: Share insights and strategies to reinforce learning at home.

Observation Tips for Teachers

- Observe students in various settings (e.g., group activities, free play, structured tasks).
- Take anecdotal notes to supplement assessment scores.
- Avoid personal biases; focus on consistent and fair evaluations.
- Use student self-reflections when appropriate.
